A Message from Fr. Kubista:

We are to keep the important things in our lives in front of us. One very important aspect is that we are to be concerned about saving souls, to save our own and the souls of others. It is Jesus who saves and we are to cooperate with his saving power (the Holy Spirit) and allow him to use us as instruments to save souls. The last statement in the Code of Canon Law of the Catholic Church says that it is *"the salvation of souls, which must always be the supreme law in the Church"* (Can. 1752) So most of what we do should have an element which focuses on the salvation of souls.

We are to influence our society to be Christ centered and to follow the ways of God. It is the right thing to do and promotes more people to follow Christ in order for them to be saved. We are to promote ideas and actions which are in line with God's ways, which means we have to know what these are and how to live our lives accordingly. We are to be consumers of things (food, entertainment, goods, services, etc) which are made and used in ways that do not violate God's laws. We are to influence society through laws which should follow the ways of God and thus influence persons towards that which is good. We are to be vigilant and make sure no laws are enacted which violate the life of any person in any condition. If a law allows for an evil it can lead people away from God and be the cause of them to lose their soul.

A society with legal abortion can move a person to think that killing a baby is morally acceptable and can have a negative impact on their soul and the soul of the child. The child is not given a chance to be born (therefore they are not able to make choices in living their lives) and they are not baptized or able to receive other sacraments that facilitate their growth in the love of God. We trust that God is merciful to unborn babies and gives them an opportunity to choose Him. A mother who decides to kill her baby is impacted by that choice emotionally, physically, and especially spiritually, which then can lead her to think less of herself, of life, and of God, and choosing this serious moral evil impacts her soul and in ways that she does not know. By promoting life and supporting her to bring the child to birth, this can be a huge factor to draw her closer to Christ and to foster a society of life positively impacting many aspects within it.

A society needs to protect those near the end of their lives, those who can be threatened by euthanasia which typically is the killing of someone close to death or who is suffering. A person (doctor, patient, etc) who is allowed to kill is not being helped or supported but rather their spiritual destruction is being facilitated. A person can be spiritually misled and wounded to the point that it is hard for them to recover thus leading to the loss of their soul. The euthanized person is denied an opportunity (especially in their last hours) to be drawn closer to God and can succumb to the temptations of the devil, one of which is despair. By allowing a person to die naturally and assisting them, we can assure them of God's love and our love for them, and allow the suffering they experience to be united to the sufferings of Christ and thus be redemptive for themselves and for others, especially those in their family.

With a focus on the salvation of souls, we are to work for the good of our society, promoting the ways of the Lord so that more people will be saved. We pray that those wounded by sin would turn to God for forgiveness and healing. God bless you.
