A Message from Fr. Kubista:

What are Sacramentals? The Catechism of the Catholic Church says: "Sacramentals are sacred signs instituted by the Church. They prepare men to receive the fruit of the sacraments and sanctify different circumstances of life." (CCC 1677) Sacrosanctum Concilium (SC) says that sacramentals "are sacred signs which bear a resemblance to the sacraments: they signify effects, particularly of a spiritual kind, which are obtained through the Church's intercession. By them men are disposed to receive the chief effect of the sacraments, and various occasions in life are rendered holy." (SC, 60) It continues: "There is hardly any proper use of material things which cannot thus be directed toward the sanctification of men and the praise of God." (SC, 61) "Sacramentals are instituted for the sanctification of certain ministries of the Church, certain states of life, a great variety of circumstances in Christian life, and the use of many things helpful to man." (CCC 1668) Sacramentals are visible signs of God's invisible grace, sanctifying daily life.

The CCC states: "Among sacramentals blessings (of persons, meals, objects, and places) come first." (CCC 1671) The Catholic Encyclopedia says: "The special virtue recognized by the Church and experienced by Christians in the sacramentals should consist in the official prayers whereby we implore God to pour forth special graces on those who make use of the sacramentals. These prayers move God to give graces which He would not otherwise give, and when not infallibly acceded to it is for reasons known to His Wisdom. God is aware of the measure in which He should bestow His gifts."

Sacramentals have various effects. The CE says: "One of the most remarkable effects of sacramentals is the virtue to drive away evil spirits whose mysterious and baleful operations affect sometimes the physical activity of man." "When the Church asks publicly and authoritatively in the name of Jesus Christ that a person or object be protected against the power of the Evil One and withdrawn from his dominion, it is called exorcism.... Exorcism is directed at the expulsion of demons or to the liberation from demonic possession through the spiritual authority which Jesus entrusted to his Church." (CCC 1673) Exorcism is a sacramental.

Sacramentals are images, actions, objects, devotions to saints, and blessings "that are unique to our faith; those sometimes humble reminders of what the Catholic faith is all about" The CCC says: "The religious sense of the Christian people has always found expression in various forms of piety surrounding the Church's sacramental life, such as the veneration of relics, visits to sanctuaries, pilgrimages, processions, the stations of the cross, religious dances, the rosary, medals, etc." (CCC 1674) Because we are spiritual and physical beings (soul and body), we desire things we can physically touch, see, say (sing, chant, recite), feel, and experience with our senses and this helps us to be reminded of and grow in our faith. A sacramental reminds us of various things: the sign of the cross of the Trinity (CNA said was the chief sacramental), a crucifix of the death of Jesus, holy water of our Baptism, candles that Jesus is the light of the world, ashes of our mortality, palms of Jesus' triumphant ride into Jerusalem, the Stations of the Cross of the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus, the Angelus of the Incarnation, the Rosary of the life of Christ, and the Divine Mercy Chaplet of God's great mercy and our need for it. There is debate on whether sacramentals by themselves remit sins. We do know that they can move our minds and hearts to a greater love of God, allowing Him to shower us with His Grace which can include remitting our sins.

It is good to have sacramentals on our person (a scapular, St. Benedict medal, the Miraculous Medal, and/or a crucifix), in the car (crucifix on the rear view mirror and/or St. Christopher (protector of travelers) item somewhere), in the home (a crucifix in each bedroom, an image or statue of the Sacred Heart, Mary, St. Joseph, St Michael the Archangel, and other saints) and other appropriate places. God bless you.
