A Message from Fr. Kubista:

The brown scapular is a sacramental. The Vatican's Directory on Popular Piety and the Liturgy says: "The scapular is an external sign of the filial relationship established between the Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother and Queen of Mount Carmel, and the faithful who entrust themselves totally to her protection, who have recourse to her maternal intercession, who are mindful of the primacy of the spiritual life and the need for prayer."

The brown scapular has its roots in the Carmelite Order, which started on Mount Carmel, which is near Haifa Israel. That is where a group of monastics lived who had a particular devotion to the Virgin Mary, hence their patroness who was called Our Lady of Mount Carmel. If we go back to the Old Testament, Mount Carmel is where the Prophet Elijah, in offering a sacrifice to God, destroys the evil Prophets of the pagan god, Baal. The scapular is like the mantle (cloak made of cloth) worn by Elijah. St Dominic (1170 – 1221AD) said: "One day, Brother Angelus, to your Order of Carmel the Most Blessed Virgin Mary will give a devotion to be known as the Brown Scapular, and to my Order of Preachers she will give a devotion to be known as the Rosary. And one day, through the rosary and the scapular, she will save the world." In the late 1200AD, because of persecution, the Carmelite Order spread from Mount Carmel to Europe including England. In Aylesford, England on July 16, 1251, the brown scapular was presented by Mary to St. Simon Stock. She said: "Take this scapular. It shall be a sign of salvation, a protection in danger and a pledge of peace. Whosoever dies wearing this scapular shall not suffer eternal fire."

Another promise is the Sabbatine Privilege which was issued by Pope Paul V in 1613: "It is permitted to preach that the Blessed Virgin will help by her continued assistance and her merits, particularly on Saturdays, the souls of the members of the Scapular Confraternity [reason for enrollment] who have died in the grace of God, if in life they had worn the scapular, observed chastity according with their state of life, and recited the Office of the Blessed Virgin Mary." Substitutes for the third condition are: praying 3 Hail Marys; or 7 Our Fathers with Hail Mary and Glory Be; or the Divine Office; or the Rosary; or abstaining from meat on Wednesdays and Saturdays. This privilege has been affirmed by a number of popes including the recent popes of St. Pius X, Pius XI, and Pius XII.

The brown scapular is also connected to the message of Fatima. Mary appeared at Fatima on October 13, 1917 identifying herself as Our Lady of the Rosary and after the miracle of the sun, she appeared as our Lady of Mount Carmel holding the scapular (an indication that we should wear it). St. Lucia, one of the Fatima visionaries, said in an interview with two Carmelite priests on September 13, 1949, that *"the Rosary and the scapular are inseparable. The scapular is a sign of consecration to Our Lady."* She indicated that wearing the scapular was one of the Fatima messages and is as important as saying a daily rosary.

St John Paul II wrote on the 750th anniversary of the scapular: "Therefore two truths are evoked by the sign of the scapular: On the one hand, the constant protection of the Blessed Virgin, not only on life's journey, but also at the moment of passing into the fullness of eternal glory; on the other, the awareness that devotion to her cannot be limited to prayers and tributes in her honor on certain occasions, but must become a 'habit,' that is, a permanent orientation of one's own Christian conduct, woven of prayer and interior life, through frequent reception of the sacraments and the concrete practice of the spiritual and corporal works of mercy. In this way the scapular becomes a sign of the 'covenant' and reciprocal communion between Mary and the faithful" God bless you.

Stained Glass Window Project Update

TerHaar has removed about half of the windows for refurbishment. The windows will be at TerHaar's shop getting all the lead replaced and any defects in the glass fixed. After these windows are all fixed up, around mid June, TerHaar will put the refurbished windows back in and take the other half of the windows out. At that time, they will fix up all the storms on the outside, and seal them so while the other windows are out (from June until Oct) we will have a clear view to the outside. Thank you for all those who have donated and helped on this project.
