#### A Message from Fr. Kubista:

We are called to grow in the cardinal virtue of prudence. The Catechism of the Catholic Church says: "Prudence is the virtue that disposes practical reason to discern our true good in every circumstance and to choose the right means of achieving it." (CCC 1806) The Catholic Dictionary says: "it is the moral virtue that enables a person to devise, choose, and prepare suitable means for the attainment of any purpose or the avoidance of any evil". Prudence is assessing a situation (an act of the intellect), making a decision (an act of the will) to do something that will achieve what is good, right, and best under the circumstances, and then carrying out that action.

Prudence is first an act in the intellect as we assess the situation that is before us. We consider the various angles, perspectives, and options as to what we will do. What would Jesus have us do; what would be his recommendation? What is best for all; how can we truly love all those persons involved, including ourselves? How can our actions be perceived; can they be scandalous or hypocritical? What is most effective in order to accomplish the goal we have in mind? Do we need to say or do something or both? It is the right time or do we need to wait? What is the right tone and approach; is there a better way? Maybe we can ask others what they think and get their perspective. The Book of Proverbs emphasizes this: "The fool spurns a father's instruction, but whoever heeds reproof is prudent." (Prv 15:5) We are to pray to God, Mary, St. Joseph, or the Saints, for their help and guidance as to how to proceed.

We are to consider all the options that come to mind realizing that God (especially the Holy Spirit) may speak to us in our thoughts through our intuition or imparting us with wisdom. Once we have come up with an approach and decide how to act, then we make a choice with our will. Because we have discerned the proper action, we are to have the courage to do it and carry out the action. St Thomas Aquinas says: "The prudent man considers things afar off, in so far as they tend to be a help or a hindrance to that which has to be done at the present time" and then acts accordingly. (Summa Theologiae II.II.1)

We are to practice prudence which means we have to make a concerted effort to think things through, make a decision, and then act. Since our use of reason and thinking is important in prudence, we are to guard the thoughts, ideas, and information that come into our minds and make sure it is good, truthful, and in right and sound reason. It is so important to read good books, watch good movies, listen to good music or podcasts, to make sure our minds are being influenced in virtuous and Godly ways. We have to not be afraid to make mistakes in judgment rather we are to make a decision with trust in God and then learn and grow from it. When we act, to review our actions and ask if we could have acted differently to bring about a better outcome. We are to grow in self knowledge, which is why it is so important to examine our lives and the things that can lead into sin or poor actions. We are to determine the things and situations in which we are more vulnerable and trigger bad actions, especially those that are habitual. We should come up with some plan or set proper boundaries to avoid falling into the same sin or mistake again, to try to avoid acting imprudently in the future.

We pray that God and others would help us grow in prudence. That our thoughts, judgments, and then actions would always have at their end, that which is best for all, so that we truly are loving God, ourselves, and our neighbor as we should. God bless you.
