A Message from Fr. Kubista:

As Catholics, we are required each week to go to Mass and not necessarily to receive Jesus in the Eucharist. Receiving the Eucharist is a sacrament and coming to Mass is not, which is why anyone can come to Mass and only Catholics (not in the state of mortal sin) can receive the Eucharist. It is so important for us to come to Mass each week.

We come to Mass to worship, adore, and give praise to God, which is a sign of our thanksgiving to Him. God does not need this from us, but we need it. We need to acknowledge the power and might of God, how He has created us, sustains us, and holds all things in existence. It helps us to know our place and dependence on Him, for if we forget, we will lose our way. It trains us to worship, adore, and give praise to God in our lives. When we accomplish something, we thank God and acknowledge His goodness to us. In all our experiences (encounters) we can raise our heart and mind to God, acknowledging how He is assisting and giving us the ability to act; to be who He wants us to be. Others with whom we worship can inspire us and encourage us to live out what we experience at Mass.

We come to Mass to offer our lives to God, uniting them to the sacrifice Jesus offers at Mass. The offertory is when we offer ourselves (our entire lives) and the money collected is part of that offering. This offering is to be a sacrifice so we want to give God the best that we can so that God will accept and be pleased with our offering. We want to be like Abel (who gave his best) whose offering was accepted by God, and not like Cain (who did not give his best) whose was rejected. Our offering and sacrifice is united to Christ's and thus can make reparation for our sins which we acknowledge at the beginning of Mass. We are to live out our offering in our lives by sacrificing for God and others. We are to offer up our works, pains, joys, sufferings, disappointments, etc., uniting them with the sacrifices of Christ and thus all that we do (our entire life) has meaning.

We come Mass to be nourished spiritually, to receive Jesus in the Word (the Bible) and most profoundly in the Eucharist, which is truly his body, blood, soul, and divinity. We are to listen to the prayers and readings (especially the Gospel) and try to glean various enlightenments and knowledge from them; to be taught by the Holy Spirit. We receive Jesus in the Eucharist, who is food for our soul, who helps us to be more conformed to his image and likeness, who shares the Holy Spirit to help and strengthen us, uniting us more profoundly with the Church. Nourished with this food, we then can go out into the world to be a better image of Christ, to live as he would have us live, to be a person of charity, faith, hope, kindness, joy, peace, gentleness, to be someone who inspires others to follow Christ. It is only from the help and nourishment we receive from Christ that we are able to fulfill his command to spread the Good News.

We are grateful for the Mass which reminds us of various things that we are to do in our lives. We pray that when we come to Mass, we will be open to the workings and transformation of the Holy Spirit, so that when we leave Mass and go into the world, we can truly live as we ought, to live as God would have us, giving glory and praise to Him, offering our entire lives to Him, and allowing our daily lives to help strengthen us as his disciples who bear witness to His love for us. Dear Jesus, help me to live out the Mass in my life. God bless you.

April is the Month of the Holy Spirit

The month of April is dedicated to the Holy Spirit. To believe in the Holy Spirit is to profess that the Holy Spirit is one of the persons of the Holy Trinity, consubstantial with the Father and the Son: "with the Father and the Son he is worshipped and glorified." *(Catechism of the Catholic Church)*

The Holy Spirit is the Person of Love in the life of God. He is also like a breath, an aspiration of infinite Love, from which we draw the breath of life. On the day of Pentecost the Divine Spirit communicated such an abundance of life to the whole Church that to symbolize it "there came a sound from heaven, as of a violent wind coming, and it filled the whole house where they (the Apostles) were sitting."

But it is also for us that the Holy Spirit has come, for the group in the Cenacle represented the whole Church. The Holy Spirit came to remain with the Church forever. This is the promise of Jesus Himself. He dwells in the Church permanently and unfailingly, performing in it without ceasing His action of life-giving and sanctification. He establishes the Church infallibly in the truth. It is He Who makes the Church blossom forth with a marvelous supernatural fruitfulness, for He brings to life and full fruition in Virgins, Martyrs, and Confessors those heroic virtues which are one of the marks of true sanctity.
