#### A Message from Fr. Kubista:

Hell is a horrible place. God certainly does not want anyone to go there because we are made to be with Him. We should not want anyone to go to Hell.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) tells us that "the chief punishment of Hell is eternal separation from God, in whom alone man can possess the life and happiness for which he was created and for which he longs." (CCC 1035) Separation from God (for all eternity) is horrible. Jesus tells us that the wicked will be thrown "into the fiery furnace, where there will be wailing and grinding of teeth."(Mt 13:50) Jesus later says "And throw this useless servant into the darkness outside, where there will be wailing and grinding of teeth."(Mt 25:30) Jesus tells us that those in Hell regret the lost the opportunity they had to be with God forever. St Thomas says that the dammed will not have the "light of divine knowledge"(not be with God), increased suffering, and their bodies burdensome and heavy.

Scripture makes a point that we do not want to go to Hell for it is horrible. Jesus tells us that it would be better to have our hand cut off or our eye poked out rather than enter Gehenna (Hell) with them.(Mt 5:29-30) Jesus shares with us how the body will share in the pains of Hell: "where 'their worm does not die, and the fire is not quenched." (Mk 9:48) Isaiah also says it: "For their worm shall not die, their fire shall not be extinguished; and they shall be an abhorrence to all flesh." (Is 66:24) If the worm does not die, it means that our flesh is constantly being attacked or "eaten by worms". The fire is unquenchable (it never stops) so the piercing pain of fire will never go away. Our body will not be consumed by the flames but rather be penetrated by them and they will not dissipate. Jesus says the wicked will be thrown into "the burning pool of fire and sulfur, which is the second death" (Rev 21:8) "And [the Rich Man] cried out, 'Father Abraham, have pity on me. Send Lazarus to dip the tip of his finger in water and cool my tongue, for I am suffering torment in these flames." (Lk 16:24) There will be darkness as St Peter tells us that Hell is a place having the "gloom of darkness"(2 Pt 2:17) These are horrible images which should help deter us from Hell.

We might wonder why God would create such a horrible place for the wicked. Having Hell as a horrible place should act as a deterrent for us so that we do not want to go there. If Hell was a great place (a nice place where we would enjoy things) then our tendency as human beings would be to want to go there rather than Heaven. We might not realize that separation from God for all eternity is the worst thing for us. So it is a good thing that Hell is horrible place so it can deter us from a desire to go there. In our world, we have laws and consequences if we violate them. These negative consequences help deter us from going against the law and so why would not we expect the same from God who loves us. The CCC affirms this saying that the things we hear about hell are a way for us to make good use of our freedom to choose our eternal destiny and *"are at the same time an urgent call to conversion."*(CCC 1036)

We are to pray for others so that they may not go to Hell. It is one of the reasons that we want to evangelize others and to share with them the good news of salvation.

We pray that we would not end up in Hell and that we would be a good witness to the joys that await us in Heaven by being a people who are faith filled, hopeful, and loving. God bless you.
