A Message from Fr. Kubista:

(Continued from last week...) There is something higher than the heavens (the sky and universe) called the highest heavens or "Heaven" and it is where God is. The prophet Nehemiah says: "You are the LORD, you alone; You made the heavens, the highest heavens and all their host, The earth and all that is upon it, the seas and all that is in them. To all of them you give life, the heavenly hosts bow down before you. "(Nehemiah 9:6) "Our God is in heaven and does whatever he wills." (Psalm 115:3) The prophet Amos says: "Who has built his upper chamber in heaven, and established his vault over the earth". (Amos 9:6) God sits on His throne in the upper chambers, the higher levels of heaven.

There are a number of references to God's throne. Ezekiel has a vision of heaven. "Above the firmament over their heads was the likeness of a throne that looked like sapphire; and upon this likeness of a throne was seated, up above, a figure that looked like a human being. And I saw something like polished metal, like the appearance of fire enclosed on all sides, from what looked like the waist up; and from what looked like the waist down, I saw something like the appearance of fire and brilliant light surrounding him. Just like the appearance of the rainbow in the clouds on a rainy day so was the appearance of brilliance that surrounded him. Such was the appearance of the likeness of the glory of the LORD. "(Ez 1:26-28) Daniel has a dream: "As I watched, Thrones were set up and the Ancient of Days took his throne. His clothing was white as snow, the hair on his head like pure wool; His throne was flames of fire, with wheels of burning fire. A river of fire surged forth, flowing from where he sat; Thousands upon thousands were ministering to him, and myriads upon myriads stood before him. The court was convened, and the books were opened. "(Dn 7:9-10) Jesus talks about the throne. "Amen, I say to you that you who have followed me, in the new age, when the Son of Man is seated on his throne of glory, will yourselves sit on twelve thrones, judging the twelve tribes of Israel. "(Mt 19:28) In John's vision, Jesus says: "I will give the victor the right to sit with me on my throne, as I myself first won the victory and sit with my Father on his throne" (Rev 3:21) John sees a vision of the throne that is in heaven. "After this I had a vision of an open door to heaven, and I heard the trumpet like voice that had spoken to me before, saving, "Come up here and I will show you what must happen afterwards." At once I was caught up in spirit. A throne was there in heaven, and on the throne sat one whose appearance sparkled like jasper and carnelian. Around the throne was a halo as brilliant as an emerald. Surrounding the throne I saw twenty-four other thrones on which twenty-four elders sat, dressed in white garments and with gold crowns on their heads. From the throne came flashes of lightning, rumblings, and peals of thunder. Seven flaming torches burned in front of the throne, which are the seven spirits of God. In front of the throne was something that resembled a sea of glass like crystal. In the center and around the throne, there were four living creatures covered with eves in front and in back. The first creature resembled a lion, the second was like a calf, the third had a face like that of a human being, and the fourth looked like an eagle in flight. The four living creatures, each of them with six wings, were covered with eves inside and out. Day and night they do not stop exclaiming: "Holv, holy, holy is the Lord God almighty, who was, and who is, and who is to come." Whenever the living creatures give glory and honor and thanks to the one who sits on the throne, who lives forever and ever, "(Rev 4:1-9) (Continued next week...)
